- 1 **ANTISLAVERY CAMPAIGNERS.** - Abolition of the slave trade. (No pl.), 2007.  
6 postal stamps issued by the Royal Mail Postal Service in England, after design by Howard Brown. Printed in lithography by Cartor Security Printing, depicting portraits of six of the most prominent antislavery campaigners of their time. € 25,00


The stamps were issued on the bicentennial of the abolition of the slave trade in 1807 depicting Hannah More, Ignatius Sancho, William Wilberforce, Olaudah Equiano, Granville Sharp and Thomas Clarkson. Through their efforts, the passing of the Abolition of the Slave Trade Act in 1807 became one of the most significant moments in British history. Royal Mail has issued these stamps to commemorate the work of these six remarkable campaigners on the 200th anniversary of the Slave Trade Act.

From: Johann Baptist von Spix & Karl Friedrich Philipp von Martius *Atlas zur Reise in Brasilien.* - The atlas appeared in instalments and is rarely found complete. From 1817 to 1820 the botanist and traveller Martius (1794-1868) travelled in Brazil together with the zoologist Spix (1781-1826). Their journey was a scientific expedition, financed by king Maximilian Joseph I of Bavaria. -

Composer William Henry Myddleton (1873-1950). *Swanee River* is a minstrel song written by Stephen Foster in 1851. Since 1935, it has been the official state song of Florida, although in 2008 the original lyrics were revised. The song is written from the point of view of an African slave, and its main theme is the feelings of a slave that has been sold away from his family. Foster was a supporter of abolishing slavery.



Fine coloured plates issued on the occasion of the International Colonial and Export Trade Exhibition on the Museumplein in Amsterdam in 1883. Besides the colonial products that were displayed, 38 people from the Dutch East Indies and 28 from

Suriname were brought here and put on show. The plates depict: Hoofdingang, Blik in de hoofdgalerij, Afdeeling Nederlandshe koloniën, Drinkhal der brouwerij De Haan & de Sleutels, Internationaal wijnhuis, Centrum der voornaamste restauratiën, Centrum van het gebouw voor de Ned. Koloniën, Voorgevel der afdeeling 'Nederlandsche Koloniën', Paviljoen van Z.M. den koning, Paviljoen der stad Amsterdam, Atjeh monument, Paleis van Tunis Tabaks plantage in de afdeeling Ned. 11 **CLAY, Henry.** Speech of Henry Clay, of Kentucky, on taking up his compromise resolutions on the subject of slavery. Delivered in Senate, Febr. 5th & 6th, 1850. New York, Stringer & Townsend, 1850.

*First edition.* - Congress ultimately approved Clay's bill, which became known as the Compromise of 1850. Despite widespread acceptance of the compromise, it soon became obvious that it offered only a temporary solution to the problem, as its vague language left much open to debate (*Rodriguez, Encycl. of world slavery, p.159*).

*Anti-Slavery Tracts. No.4. New series.* - William Lloyd Garrison (1805 - 1879) was a prominent American abolitionist, journalist, suffragist, and social reformer. He is best known as the editor of the abolitionist newspaper *The Liberator*, which he founded with Isaac Knapp in 1831 and published in Massachusetts until slavery was abolished by Constitutional amendment after the American Civil War. He was one of the founders of the American Anti-Slavery Society. He promoted "immediate emancipation" of slaves in the United States.



18 **MORSE, Sidney Edwards**. Premium questions on slavery, each admitting of a yes or no answer; addressed to the editors of the New York Independent and New York Evangelist. New York, Harper & Brothers, 1860.

An impassioned list of 232 questions on slavery, each admitting of a yes or no answer which author Sidney Morse, submitted to the press. Sidney Edwards Morse (1794 - 1871) was a U.S. inventor, geographer and journalist. He was the brother of telegraphy pioneer and painter Samuel F. B. Morse. In 1823 he moved to New York, and with his brother, Richard Cary Morse, founded the *New York Observer*, which eventually became the oldest weekly in New York City, and the oldest religious newspaper in the state.

19 **NETSCHER, A(driaan) D(avid) van der GON**. Van der Gon Netscher (1811-1897), a coffee and sugar planter in the West Indies, published several pamphlets concerning slavery in Suriname. His reflection of October 25 1858 addressed to the States General was published a few years before the abolition of slavery in the Netherlands (1862). - (Small library stamp on title-page).

23 **PARKER, Joel**. An address before the citizens of Cambridge, October 1, 1856. Cambridge, James Munroe and Comp., 1856.

A speech given by Joel Parker, professor of constitutional law at Harvard and later the Governor of New Jersey, concerning the constitutionality of new states being admitted to the Union and

representation. Parker opposes the admission of new slave states on the grounds that they gain disproportionate representation due to their holding slaves. - *Sabin 58702*

24 **PEABODY, Ephraim.** Slavery in the United States: its evils, alleviations, and remedies. Boston, Charles C. Little and James Brown, 1851.

Reprinted from the *North American Review*, October, 1851. - Ephraim Peabody (1807-1856) was an early Unitarian missionary to the western United States and later minister of King's Chapel in Boston. He carefully issues that include "how far and how fast is the institution of slavery susceptible of change and amelioration - what are the prospects of its being removed - and what can be done to promote its removal (*Dumond, p. 90*).

25 **SHERWOOD, Lorenzo.** Remarks on the course of the slaveholders' conspiracy against democratic government. (No pl., 1862).

'Sherwood opposed slavery and argued that Congress had the right to decide the slavery question in the territories. Maligned by opponents for his views, including support for free-soil doctrines and federal government supremacy, he was driven from the legislature in 1856, labelled anti-southern, threatened with death should he chose to speak, and kept from serving as a delegate to the Secession Convention' (*Kleiner, Handbook of Texas Online*).

26 **STUART, Moses.** Conscience and the constitution with remarks on the recent speech of Daniel Webster in the Senate of the United States on the subject of slavery. Boston, Crocker & Brewster, 1850. 119 pp. € 45,00

Moses Stuart (1780-1852) discusses the problems of ending slavery. After the election of 1848, a new sectional crisis loomed, and Daniel Webster (1782-1852) tried to preserve the nation (*Rodriguez, Encycl. of world slavery, p. 687*).

27 **WALE, S.H.** State sovereignty and slavery. Speech delivered at Bridgeport, Conn., March, 1865. Pending the State election. New York, MacDonald & Swank, 1867.

28 **WEBSTER, Daniel.** Speech upon the subject of slavery; delivered in the United States Senate on Thursday, March 7, 1850. Boston, Hotchkiss & Comp., 1850.

Daniel Webster (1782-1852) was a leading orator, statesmen, and lawyer. In his famous 'Seventh of March' speech in 1850, he claimed that keeping the nation together was more important than the issue of slavery. He was widely praised by people in the South but condemned by his own party and Northern abolitionists (*Rodriguez, Encyclopedia of world slavery, p.687*). - (Margins stained).

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
